And the Inquisition which you or any two of you, shall make under your or any two your hands & Seals, you are hereby required, within thirty days after such view shall be had & made by you, to cause the same to be filed in the Clerks Office of this County of Ulster, Given under my hand & Seal this Nineteenth day of May one thousand Eight hundred & Seven -
