Mayor Can Serve As Manager

94-52,; Op Atty Gen (Inf) No. 98-8. As a result of the Village of Monticello Local Law No. 4 for the year 1992, the Village Board of Trustees may compensate the Mayor while he exercises the duties and responsibilities of the Village Manager until a permanent appointment is made.

To the Editor:

(This is the text of a memo provided to the Monticello Village board on August 12.)

Local Law No. 4 of the year 1992 (enacted into law by a previous administration), provides as follows:

"In the event the Village Manager is unable to serve by reason of death, resignation, or other vacancy of office, the Mayor of the Village of Monticello shall serve in the capacity of the Village Manager and exercise the duties and responsibilities of that office, until a permanent appointment is made."

The Village Law of the State of New York §5-520 (4) authorizes the board of trustees, during a fiscal yearby resolution, to make additional appropriations or increase existing appropriations.

The State Comptroller, in an opinion No. 88-59, in discussing increasing the salaries of village officials during their term of office, stated:

"The salaries and wages of village officers and employees must be included in the village's tentative budget (Village Law, §5-506 [1] [f]). tive budget and any revision of the budget, the wages and salaries become fixed at the amounts shown at the time the budget is adopted (Village Law, §5-506 [4]). Section 5-520 (4) of the Village Law authorizes the board of trustees to adopt resolutions during the fiscal year to create additional appropriations and to increase existing appropriations. Based on this authority, we have concluded that the salaries of elective village officers-may be increased during the fiscal year (1981 Opns St Comp No. 81-86, p. 87; 1979

Opns St Comp No. 79-413, unreported: 34 Opns St Comp, 1978, p. 114). Funds for such an increase may be provided by transfers from the unexpended balance of the appropriation, from the appropriation for contingencies, from unappropriated cash surplus or unanticipated revenues within a fund or by borrowing pursuant to the Local Finance Law (Village Law, §5-520 [4])."

As such, it is permissible for the Board of Trustees to provide additional compensation for a Board member to perform additional duties, as is the case here.

Since no separate office or position of employment is being created in this case by the Board of Trustees, no question as to the compatibility of the two officers arises. As such, there is no conflict with Village Law, §3-300 (3) which provides that no person shall simultaneously hold an elective and appointed office.

It is well established that a village is authorized to amend or supercede any provision of the Village Law relating to its property, affairs, or government or to other matters in relation to which it is authorized to adopt local laws, notwithstanding that the Village Law provision is a general law unless the Legislature has expressly prohibited the adoption of the proposed local law.
