
UPPER DELASARE UU STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

- **To join with others in the tradition of free and open religion in affiliation with the Unitarian Universalist Association;

**To bear witness to our convictions as Unitarian Universalists in this entire region by giving our support to the Upper Delaware Fellowship through the dedication of our energies and time and finances, knowing that unless the local group is strong and healthy, little else can be accomplished.

While in Florida, we were active and involved in the Lake Region UU in Lakeland, about ten minutes from where we live. 

Yes, we do have expenses as a Fellowship!



July 7 - We start this month of July with "Shared Readings." This is always a popular program, with

each person invited to share a reading of choice -- poetry or prose, contemporary or ancient, serious or humorous. No readings, no program. So dig into your files or memory for something to share with the group.

July 14 - Barbara Pontier will be leading the program on "Facts and Myths About the Family." The big phrase in political and many religious circles is "family values." Has the family fallen apart? Divorce is at an all-time high; teen-age pregnancy continues to rise; child and spousal abuse is prevalent; single parent families are on the increase. Should we/can we return to some golden age of the past? A vital program that should provoke a vital discussion.

July 21 - We will be having a speaker from the Alcohol and Drug Recovery Center in Monticello, with Joe Walker in charge of the program. Both drugs and alcohol have had a devastating effect on tremendous number of people, destroying lives and families, with disasterous effects on society as a whole. This is a program that should evoke widespread interest.

July 28 - Barbara Lutz will be leading a program and discussion on "Ralph Waldo Emerson." Emerson was a leading literary figure of the 19th century, a poet of some stature, but known best for his Essays. A life-long Unitarian, he served a church for several years as a Unitarian minister before devoting his life to writing and traveling the lecture circuit. Come and learn about this influential Unitarian.



February 18 - John Paul Hudson will be leading a program on "Faith and Politics." Another vital topic during a coming Presidential year. John Paul Hudson is a frequent attender of our Fellowship, and adds much by his gracious presence and thoughtful insights.

February 25 - An audio tape on the subject of "Welfare" willbe listened to and discussed. Another hot topic! The tape is part of a series by Progressive Magazine on the issues of our times. They are informative and provocative. A good program.

THE MARCH PROGRAMS

March 3 - John Paul Hudson will have a program about "The Reality of Satan." 'In our world of much evil and wrong, the devil has made a comeback in some circles. A scholarly new book on "The Origin of Satan" has recently been published (which your Newsletter Editor is reading). So what do you think? 

October 3 - "What Does It Mean to be Homophobic?" Sharon Paige Lisenbee will lead the program in which we will test some of our own feelings and attitudes. In our society in which Gays and Lesbians are seeking and receiving greater acceptance, how do we fit in? What are the sterotypes and prejuduces we may hold? It is hoped that we will engage in an honest and positive sharing of views and feelings.

October 10 - About the most hopeful news recently was the signing of the Mutual Recognition Agreement between the Palestinian Liberation Organization and the Israeli Government. Speaking about this new hope for peace in the Middle East will be Bert Feldman who will share some of his own opinions and views. Bert Feldman is known to most of us as a regular columnist for <u>The River Reporter</u> who is not afraid of controversial subjects. He has spoken to our Fellowship several times previously.


October 17 - "Martin Luther's Unfinished Reformation" will be the Rev. Raymond Pontier's subject. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed his "95 Theses" to the church door in Wittenburg, Germany -- and unleashed the forces leading to the Protestant Reformation. New members and their integration into the life of the institution constitute, over the long haul, the life blood of the liberal church. So welcoming new members is always a satisfying event: we experience community and hope, strength for future years, the satisfaction of survival.

At the same time any minister knows that not all new members will stick it out for the long haul. My hunch is about half who join our congregations across the United States and Canada will eventually drop out, the Church having served a purpose or need no longer felt. It's been said, jokingly and not so jokingly, that Unitarian Universalism is for many a way station en route from Methodism to the golf course.

I think those most likely to pull out after a few months or a few years are new members who are especially excited about one or two aspects of their newly discovered church: its social action program, its religious educational approach, the style of a particular minister, or those exhilarated momentarily by the discovery of theological freedom from narrow moralisms and creedal straitjackets. Or ones who have found "their kind of people," and the immediate pleasure that goes with being in a community that mirrors one's own values and enthusiasms.

But the ones who stick, who join with their whole life, the ones who become pillars without whom the church would not last for a generation they are a different breed. They are not better people. They are not worse people. They are just different. They tend to be quieter... They are not emotional or enamoured or energetic, or if they are, the emotion is less flashy, below the surface....

They are not as idealistic as they could be. They do not expect the Church to solve all their problems or change the world that much. They carry long memories, do not demand, are tolerant of ambiguity, accepting of real difference, knowledgeable about limitation. They also zero in where they are needed. They usher a lot, worry about Church property, start endowments. They work on Church financial problems, not for one year, or two, but decades. They look after other members, make hospital calls. They are there in good times, giving out rather than consuming; they are there in bad times, mediating crises rather than causing them. They may take off on Easter; you'll see them in Church the low Sunday after.

As I look back on the years I've had a part in welcoming new members to Unitarian Universalist societies, my hopes have now little to do with numbers, I've serviced Churches where we took in fewer than two a year and Churches where over a hundred a year was par. What I look for, what I hope for, regardless of how many join, is that we luck into a few Churchwomen and Churchmen, institutionalists who know what it takes to keep a Church going, who join with their whole lives, who join for Rev. Clarke Wells keeps.







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This letter is being sent to all those people who signed the original Articles of Agreement between The River School and the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, as well as to the current Coordinator of The River School, Chris Harting, regarding our continued sponsorship and relationship.

At a special meeting of the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship on March 28, 2993, the following motion was made and passed unanimously:

"The Upper Delaware UU Fellowship will not renew sponsorship of The River School for a number of reasons, including: the lack of a viable board and the failure to meet Section 3 of the Articles of Agreement. However, reconsideration may occur upon meeting with The River School Board and authorized representatives to decide a list of requirement. mutually agreeable in order to renegotiate the terms of sponsorship."

We invite The River School Board and/or qualified representatives to meet with members of the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship at Innisfree in Milanville on Sunday, April 25, 1993 at 12:15 P. M. to deal with the following concerns of the Fellowship:

- 1. Reaffirm the spirit of the existing Articles of Agreement, and clarify them where necessary.
- 2. Guarantee a functioning River School board or committee, with Mo fewer than six meetings a year with a quorum present.
- 3. Provide the Upper Delaware UU with a list of board or committee members and officers.
- 4. Give evidence of a signed contract with a head teacher by July 15, 1993.
- 5. Provide a guarantee of The River School's financial obligation and responsibility through some form of collateral.
- 6. Provide monthly proof of the payment of all taxes and outstanding bills, along with a River School financial statement each month.
- 7. Present the UU Fellowship with a projected budget for the ensuing; year by July 1, 1993. showing both projected income and expenses.
- 8. Provide the Fellowship with a school calendar for the year, as well as a list of enrolled students by August 30, 1993.
- 9. Secure and pay for Directors and Officers Insurance for the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship.

The Upper Delaware UU Fellowship is interested in meeting with your representatives in order that we may discuss the terms and conditions set forth herein. Please advise us if you wish to convene with us at the proposed meeting on April 25th.

PURPOSE AND RESULTS OF THE WALKATHON

The Walkathon came out of Bud Rue's suggestion that our Fellowship give at least 10% of our budget to meaningful causes outside of the Fellowship. With our modest budget, Before the Walk startthis came to \$400. ed, Chairperson Glenn Pontier, announced that we would raise at least \$1,000!! And more can be expected.

This money will be distributed among the four groups voted on by the Fellowship: the Victims Intervention Center of Honesdale, Habitat for Humanity, Interfaith Outreach United of Callicoon, and the Unitarian Universalist United Nation Office.

AT SUCH A HIGH COST!

The sudden death of Bud Rue on the Walk was a tragic and painful blow. This issue of the Newsletter is dedicated to him.

New members and their integration into the life of the institution constitute, over the long haul, the life blood of the liberal church. So welcoming new members is always a satisfying event: we experience community and hope, strength for future years, the satisfaction of survival.

At the same time any minister knows that not all new members will stick it out for the long haul. My hunch is about half who join our congregations across the United States and Canada will eventually drop out, the Church having served a purpose or need no longer felt. It's been said, jokingly and not so jokingly, that Unitarian Universalism is for many a way station en route from Methodism to the golf course.

I think those most likely to pull out after a few months or a few years are new members who are especially excited about one or two aspects of their newly discovered church: its social action program, its religious educational approach, the style of a particular minister, or those exhilarated momentarily by the discovery of theological freedom from narrow moralisms and creedal straitjackets. Or ones who have found "their kind of people," and the immediate pleasure that goes with being in a community that mirrors one's own values and enthusiasms.

But the ones who stick, who join with their whole life, the ones who become pillars without whom the church would not last for a generation they are a different breed. They are not better people. They are not worse people. They are just different. They tend to be quieter...They are not emotional or enamoured or energetic, or if they are, the emotion is less flashy, below the surface....

They are not as idealistic as they could be. They do not expect the Church to solve all their problems or change the world that much. They carry long memories, do not demand, are tolerant of ambiguity, accepting of real difference, knowledgeable about limitation. They also zero in where they are needed. They usher a lot, worry about Church property, start endowments. They work on Church financial problems, not for one year, or two, but decades. They look after other members, make hospital calls. They are there in good times, giving out rather than consuming; they are there in bad times, mediating crises rather than causing them. They may take off on Easter; you'll see them in Church the low Sunday after,

As I look back on the years I've had a part in welcoming new members to Unitarian Universalist societies, my hopes have now little to do with numbers, I've serviced Churches where we took in fewer than two a year and Churches where over a hundred a year was par. What I look for, what I hope for, regardless of how many join, is that we luck into a few Churchwomen and Churchmen, institutionalists who know what it takes to keep a Church going, who join with their whole lives, who join for **Rev. Clarke Wells** keeps.

The Unitarian Universalist approach to religion has a fundamental difference from that of more orthodox churches. Instead of asserting that the ultimate truth about the nature of life has been revealed to us, we assume that, together, we must engage in a search for those things which can give meaning and importance in our lives. Ours is a vital religion; one of inquiry and growth, rather than one of preconceived answers.

Our search is not blind. It is informed by the great religious traditions, including our own Judeo-Christian heritage and liberal religious roots. It is also informed by other insights of both past and present-the richness of the arts, the knowledge of the sciences, the wisdom of experience.

I know of no other religious institution taking such an approach. Here is both a respect for the past and an openness to the future . . , a sharing of adults and children in a serious, yet joyous search.

A ROUND OF APPLAUSE FOR MARCH

If March has a dubious reputation--and it does--it is not wholly without reason. There is a hint of madness in the mere mention of the March hare. Dark deeds are somehow inherent in the Ides of March. There is March mud, there are March floods, there are the winds of March, and there is the lion-lamb tradition."

There is more to it than such items, however. The whole story of March includes the vernal equinox, daylight at last exceeding darkness. It includes red-winged blackbirds, back from the South, clamoring in the stream-side treetops. It includes pussy willows in fat, silvery catkin. Not today, not even a week from today, but one day before March ends in April. And there will be those unpredictable days when the March air is warm, the March breeze is gentle, the March sun is friendly as late April. And somewhere March is boys playing marbles, girls playing jacks and hopscotch. Maybe we give March a dubious reputation because we are an impatient kind of animal.

We haven't yet learned that the trip often is more important than the destination. With February out of the way, we want May, or April at the least; and the only way to April or May is through March. And March insists on being March, neither sinister nor mad, but a mixture of old endings and new beginnings.




MARCH 9: Laurie Stuart, who presented our beautiful Christmas program, will lead today.

For the next few days he hid the tree in his study, while he secretly decorated it with colored paper ornaments, tiny toys, and gilded egg cups filled with candies.



The Follen family invited all the children of the neighborhood to gather with them around the Christmas tree. A house guest wrote about the tree in a magazine, and soon many other families in America adopted this delightful custom.

Dr. Follen later became a Unitarian minister and an abolitionist.

WHY WE WALK-----

We walk, most surely, to remember our much loved Bud Rue, who wanted our Fellowship to be a caring community and who started our first Walk a year ago. This year we walk to support the same four groups as last year:

VICTIMS INTERVENTION PROGRAM:

Provides emergency assistance for battered and/or abused individuals while attempting to resolve difficulties through legal and counseling channels.

INTERFAITH OUTREACH UNITED: Serves area within 15 miles of Callicoon. Helps families/individuals in crisis or need through emergency funds for necessities such as food, temporary housing, heat, etc. Offers a food pantry and Christmas toy distribution for families in need.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY OF WAYNE COUNTY, PA Builds homes with low income families with no interest mortgage and no profit. Families must put up "sweat equity" and assist with construction, fund raising, or other tasks of the organization.

UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST UNITED NATIONS OFFICE Offers youth and adults training and educational opportunities through seminars, conferences and dissemination of materials to UU districts and socities. Arranges group visits to the U. N. It is a nongovernmental agency that seeks to influence the U.N. with UU hopes and dreams.

"Your Passionate Path"


Program sites include Morristown, Paramus, Ridgewood, and Summit (all New Jersey). The costs run \$39 for each program. Further information available at the Fellowship.

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

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



The total comes to less than \$4,000 for the fiscal year 1995-96 which starts on July 1st. The budget does include our annual commitment to the Program Fund of the Unitarian Universal Association and of the Metro District (our Fair Share). 





REFLECTION

While in Florida Barbara and I attended a couple of UU Fellowships. We were pleased to find Unitarian Universal-

ism alive and well in Florida, and it was good to be with some very nice UUs.

Both of us, I believe, were rather disappointed with the tenor of the worship service. The leader was much too casual and chummy to lend it any dignity.

Most of all he was unprepared. I assumed that he first thought of what he was doing when he stepped up to the lectern. Not, I felt, a very inspired performance.

I have always valued a saying I learned when I was a minister in the Reformed Church: "All things should be done decently and in good order." although this can apply to most things, it has a special relevance to a Sunday service and program. If we are to be more than a lecture series, our April 17 - Liz Huntington, who has been in-Sunday service and program should have a sense of dignity and a pattern that helps lift our

> No one needs to be a professional to conduct a Sunday service of worship. Anybody can do it. We rely upon our members and friends to share in this responsibility. But it does take some preparation beforehand -- familiarity with the order of service, selection of opening and closing words and a possible reading, choice of a hymn or hymns, Our Hymnbook has a wealth of resources, and "A Scrapbook for UUs" is also available.

By and Large, we have tried to use the followong order for our Sunday services:

GENERAL ASSEMBLY The 33rd Annual General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association will convene in Fort Worth,



Remembering Bud Rue

By RAYMOND J. PONTIER

Somewhere I remember reading these lines written by John Gardner: "Some people strengthen us just by being the kind of people they are." Bud Rue was one of those people.

His sudden and untimely death on the "Walk for Social Justice" this past Sunday was symbolic of his life. It has been said that most people are content in life to just "go about." But then there are those who find contentment only as they "go about doing good." That was Bud Rue.

In his quiet and unassuming way he provided inspiration and leadership to those seeking ways to bind up the wounds and hurts of people. He was not out to save the world, but he was determined to do what he could to make life more humane and liveable here in the Delaware Valley. He supported every good cause in our area.

A math teacher by profession, he retired from a New Jersey school district just a couple of years ago to live along the Upper Delaware which he loved.

His legacies to the river valley are

for Social Justice." The idea originated

many.

The Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship is indebted to him, not only for helping to organize it, but for providing space at Innisfree for the fellowship to meet on Sundays.

Habitat for Humanity, his greatest love, owes its existence in Wayne County to his concern for the homeless and to his persistent organizational efforts.

The Upper Delaware Chapter of Amnesty International found Bud among its charter members. In March he walked in the St. Patrick's Day Parade at Yulan carrying the group's banner.

The River School, a noble but unfulfilled experiment, was made possible because of Bud's interest and the provision of a meeting place at Innisfree.

Innisfree itself, begun as an earlier experiment to help find a way for children and young adults to discover themselves and the world around them in a meaningful way, was operated over the years as a hostel and retreat center.

There are many other legacies. Bud Rue was one of the finest human beings I have been privileged to know. He was a good person in the very best sense of the word. There was no pretense about him, nothing sanctimonious or pious or self-righteous. He was plain-spoken and honest, a man who enjoyed life and lived it fully.


His was a goodness found in qualities so easily lost in our self-serving, meanspirited and violent age — the qualities of caring and compassion and selfgiving. Bud was too modest to lay claim to it, but he really understood what Jesus meant when he said, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Bud Rue will be deeply and terribly missed. He cannot be replaced. His wonderful family will miss him most of all, but his many friends also share in the grief of his loss. I know of my own personal sense of loss, for I count Bud Rue as one of the best friends I have had anywhere.

It is tough to have the bond of friendship cut off so quickly and finally. It is helpful and hopeful to have good memories of a good friend. Who he was and what he has done shall not be forgotten.



PURPOSE AND RESULTS OF THE WALKATHON

The Walkathon came out of Bud Rue's suggestion that our Fellowship give at least 10% of our budget to meaningful causes outside of the Fellowship. With our modest budget, this came to \$400. Before the Walk started, Chairperson Glenn Pontier, announced that we would raise at least \$1,000!! And more can be expected.

This money will be distributed among the four groups voted on by the Fellowship: the Victims Intervention Center of Honesdale, Habitat for Humanity, Interfaith Outreach United of Callicoon, and the Unitarian Universalist United Nation Office.

AT SUCH A HIGH COST!

The sudden death of Bud Rue on the Walk was a tragic and painful blow, This issue of the Newsletter is dedicated to him.

New members and their integration into the life of the institution constitute, over the long haul, the life blood of the liberal church. So welcoming new members is always a satisfying event: we experience community and hope, strength for future years, the satisfaction of survival.

At the same time any minister knows that not all new members will stick it out for the long haul. My hunch is about half who join our congregations across the United States and Canada will eventually drop out, the Church having served a purpose or need no longer felt. It's been said, jokingly and not so jokingly, that Unitarian Universalism is for many a way station en route from Methodism to the golf course.

I think those most likely to pull out after a few months or a few years are new members who are especially excited about one or two aspects of their newly discovered church: its social action program, its religious educational approach, the style of a particular minister, or those exhilarated momentarily by the discovery of theological freedom from narrow moralisms and creedal straitjackets. Or ones who have found "their kind of people," and the immediate pleasure that goes with being in a community that mirrors one's own values and enthusiasms.

But the ones who stick, who join with their whole life, the ones who become pillars without whom the church would not last for a generation they are a different breed. They are not better people. They are not worse people. They are just different. They tend to be quieter...They are not emotional or enamoured or energetic, or if they are, the emotion is less flashy, below the surface....

They are not as idealistic as they could be. They do not expect the Church to solve all their problems or change the world that much. They carry long memories, do not demand, are tolerant of ambiguity, accepting of real difference, knowledgeable about limitation. They also zero in where they are needed. They usher a lot, worry about Church property, start endowments. They work on Church financial problems, not for one year, or two, but decades. They look after other members, make hospital calls. They are there in good times, giving out rather than consuming; they are there in bad times, mediating crises rather than causing them. They may take off on Easter; you'll see them in Church the low Sunday after.

As I look back on the years I've had a part in welcoming new members to Unitarian Universalist societies, my hopes have now little to do with numbers, I've serviced Churches where we took in fewer than two a year and Churches where over a hundred a year was par. What I look for, what I hope for, regardless of how many join, is that we luck into a few Churchwomen and Churchmen, institutionalists who know what it takes to keep a Church going, who join with their whole lives, who join for keeps. **Rev. Clarke Wells**






On Saturday, May 6th from 9 AM to 4:30 PM, the Metro District is spon-

MILANVILLE — Representatives from local human service organizations recently accepted \$4000 raised by a religious fellowship in Milanville.

The money was raised during a July square dance and an October walkathon sponsored by the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. Hundreds of local people contributed to these efforts.

Fellowship treasurer Ann Rue said the four beneficiaries share a commitment to the ideals of social responsibility and human freedom. The money was evenly divided among the following groups: Interfaith Outreach United (IOU), a Callicoon-based agency that provides emergency relief to western Sullivan County; Habitat for Humanity of Wayne County, a grassroots ministry dedicated to building decent, affordable housing for all; Victim's Intervention Program (VIP), a Wayne County agency providing services to victims of domestic violence; and the Unitarian Universalist United Nations Office, which provides humanitarian advocacy worldwide.

The fellowship's support of humanitarian efforts was initiated by Bud Rue of Milanville who died participating in the 1993 walkathon. To honor his charitable works, the fellowship plans to continue sponsoring the Bud Rue Memorial Walk for Social Justice as an annual fall event, Ann Rue said.

Participants walk the stretch of River Rd. between Narrowsburg and Milanville. Most of the organizations benefitting from the walk sent their own contingents to participate. Peg and Dale Rosenberg of Honesdale appeared for Habitat for Humanity, which they said is now beginning construction of its second house. The Wayne County chapter was co-founded by the late Bud Rue and is now helping to create a new affiliate in Sullivan County.

Carolyn Hubers of IOU said the \$1000 came at a particularly good time because the organization is having a busy February. "The work of IOU goes on all year, not just at the holidays," she said.


Speaking of clients who have survived physically abusive relationships, VIP board member Linda Rose said, "Instead of being physically abused, it's nice to be helped by other people's physical exertion."

Fellowship member Gil Mende began the program by inviting anyone so inspired to light a candle in the name of a particular object or thought, or to do so silently. Rue lit one in memory of her late husband, who she said "focused our attentions on becoming more socially responsible to our fellow people."

A video entitled **Sharing a Vision of Justice** portrayed the work of the Unitarian Universalists' organizational work in aid of human freedom dating back to its response in 1939 to Nazi atrocities.

The fellowship meets at 11:00 a.m. every Sunday at Innisfree in Milanville. Its chief founders are the Rev. Raymond, consulting minister, and Barbara Pontier of Narrowsburg, who are expected to return to the area in early spring. For more information call Ann Rue at 717/729-7197.



Although final decisions as to where the money raised shall go is to be determined by the members at our Annual Meeting, the Committee recommends the same groups as last year: Habitat for Humanity, Victims Intervention Program, Interfaith Outreach United, and the UU United Nations Office.



DAILY BREAD AND OUR FOOD BOX

Y Someone suggested that an item be included in this Newsletter about our box for collecting food for those who are in real need. The Box, located in the entrance way, has been there for years. Hard to miss, but easy to forget. So this is a gentle reminder to members and friends,

urging each of you to remember.

The food that is collected is given on alternate months to food pantries in Wayne and Sullivan Counties. We collect non-perishables: canned goods of all kinds; dried soup-mixes, etc; all varieties of cereal. Even before Gingrich and company cut help for the poor and the needy, there are a lot of people out there who cannot make ends meet. So our food box is one small way of helping a few who are struggling.

DOUNTO As members of the new Congress prepare to cut help for people on welfare, for education, for medicaid and medicare for the poor and elderly, for food lunches in schools, for all kinds of "people" proprograms, the following about the "cutters" is of interest: (From: "Congressional Directory & Action Guide")

The annual salary of a member of Congress is \$129,500. For a low monthly premium, a member can have a generous life insurance policy, and a retirement system offers liberal pension benefits

In addition, a member of Congress receives free office space with furnishings, machines, and supplies. Funds are provided for staff salaries, phone bills, trips home, and operation of home offices.

Printing and radio-television broadcast taping facilities are provided. Banking facilities are available in the Capitol and free parking is provided.

Office complexes have gym facilities, dining facilities, and post offices. An attending physician is in the Second Capitol, and congresspersons can take advantage of a complete laboratory, x-rays, pharmacy, physiotherapy, and electrocardiographic service. Along with a health insurance plan, medical care is available at Walter Reed Army and Bethesda Naval Hospitals.



REMEMBERING MAY SARTON

I shall go with the changes, I shall look far out over golden grasses And blue waters....

SEE HOW THEY GROW!

The following piece was written by the Rev. Clarke Wells, recently minister of the UU Fellowship in Lakeland, Florida:

I fyou want to build up your church, I must tell you as an old pro in church-building that you cannot, I repeat cannot, build an active, attractive, enriching church life if half or two-thirds of you, on any given Sunday, are unmarshalled, disconnected, not present, gone.

Not ten dozen meetings of your membership committee will promote the health and growth of your church as much as an enthusiastic attendance on Sunday mornings. The Number One way of attracting visitors, newcomers and re-enlisting the inactive, is the sight and feel of a live congregation.

Conversely, if you want to turn off visitors, show them the sure-fire advertisement of your empty seats. Your absences echo, dear friends, quite literally. They resonate with your message of inactivity, disregard, unconcern.

Groups achieve power as they are bound and driven by regular and common sharing from a nurturing center. That center, that reality, is being in body together on Sunday morning. If you decide to marshall yourselves on Sunday, your institutional problems will melt into manageability within months. And that is simply because there's strength in numbers and joy in a full house.

Do exactly what you want to on Sunday mornings. But be aware and know the consequences of your wants for the future life of your church.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Sometimes bad things happen and yet something good comes from the bad. We don't have enough perspective on life in any given instant to be able to say with certainty whether, over time, a particular event will be beneficial or harmful in our lives. I am reminded of an old Chinese story of wisdom that a friend once told me, so I will relate a short variation of the wise tale.

A farmer awoke one morning to find a wild horse had wandered onto his farm looking for food. He put the horse in with his horses and his neighbors exclaimed how lucky it was that such a fine horse had come to him. He replied, "Maybe it is, maybe it isn't." The next evening the horse broke the fence and all his horses ran away. Was this bad? "Maybe it is, maybe it isn't." Then the government came through to tax all the property and the don estic animals, but his tax was low because of the lack of horses. Later his horses came back, including the wild one - was this good? "Maybe ... " except that his son was then motivated to tame the wild horse, so it wouldn't run away again -- and in the process was thrown and broke his arm and was laid up in bed and couldn't farm. Was it bad? "Maybe ... " But then the army came through and conscripted all able young men in the village, but left the son laid up in bed. Was this good or bad? "Maybe ... " and the story continues.

Some people say there is a silver lining in every cloud; others are afraid that good will only bring disaster. There is also the idea that the Universe is oblivious to good and bad -- that these are just our own perceptions. Perhaps the wisdom of the story is that we take what comes, and recognize that our opinion of "good" or "bad" may change as time unfolds.

I know of no other religious institution taking such an approach. Here is both a respect for the past and an openness to the future ... a sharing of adults and children in a serious, yet joyous search.



A UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST PHILOSOPHY OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In a culture where religion is defined by specific doctrinal beliefs, how do we help our children be confident in upholding their identity as Unitarian Universalists when challenged by their more orthodox_friends?

The religious education program is value centered, based on the Principles and Purposes as defined by the members of the Unitarian Universalist Association in democratic assembly. It is child centered, in the tradition of progressive education. It is based on a progression of children's religious growth. Our littlest ones need love, acceptance, trust and a feeling of being at home in this religious community. As they get older we add expression of wonder at all of creation and the need to develop friendships. At 6 or 7 children begin to learn about others, to stand in their shoes. By 8 or 9 they add UU traditions and being part of a larger religious movement. The focus for 11 year olds and up is on moral reasoning, decision-making, and issues of personal identity.

In a world of conflicting orthodoxies, we encourage inclusiveness, understanding, tolerance, and acceptance. We teach for self-confidence, curiosity, caring, and responsibility. The curriculum content includes Judeo-Christian heritage, UU history, and world religions. The context, the curriculum behind the text, is the larger issue of living moral and ethical lives, keeping alive the wonder about the miracle of life itself, and developing a sense of responsibility of making the world a better place than when we came into it. "Religious education is, for us, a creative conversation carried on between our children, ourselves, and the life that surrounds us. . . . It is an on-going adventure that has as its purposes the molding of a certain kind of person . . . who can think fully and act responsibly . . . who possess strong inner resources of courage and hope . . . and who will become persons of broad sympathies and deep compassion for all people."

This is an enormous task -- it takes all of us working together. As the African saying goes, "It takes a whole village to raise a child."



NEW HYMNBOOK

MORE ABOUT THE The Rev. Bruce Southworth of Community UU in New York City wrote the following piece a year ago. It is reprinted

because it offers a fine description of a book we will now be using at our Fellowship

> A year from now, the Unitarian Universalist Association will be overing a new hymnal for sale, and I find it an exciting prospect.

Titled Singing the Living Tradition, 55% of the music and 80% of the readings will differ from the present hard-bound U.U.A. hymnal, Hymns for the Celebration of Life (the blue book, which was published in 1964.)

Overall the new hymnal will include approximately 400 hymns and 300 readings. The color is slate gray, and the book will be somewhat larger than the present one and thus allow for larger type.

The hope is that its diversity will allow its use by all U.U. congregations. It will include familiar hymns from our tradition, favorite classics from Christian tradition, newly commissioned works, chorales, spirituals, and folk tunes from many cultures. As a letter from the Hymnbook Resource Commission notes, "there is something here for every musical taste: from Vietnamese folk songs to Duke Ellington, from the Bible to Holly Near....

"Hymns and readings will contain male, temale and neuter pronouns when referring to God and humanity. They encompass theistic and non-theistic material, transcendent and human centered spirituality.

Singing the Living Tradition will be a wonderful resource for our worship, and I imagine that many may want to purchase personal copies for your own home use. Five years of work by the Hymnbook Resources Commission is bearing fruit, and I look forward to its arrival in just about a year.

HOW TO MEET

OUR BUDGET OUR BUDGET taining items necessary for the functioning of our Fellowship and the continued presence of our liberal religious witness in this area.

This budget of pround \$4,000 will be met only if members and friends respond with financial pledges and commitments. No one is told what to give -- but we do suggest that members, in particular, have a responsibility to support the Fellowship. And we hope that many of our good friends will do so also.

So how do we meet a \$4,000 budget with our relatively small membership? To do so means we need an average income of about \$77 a week -- something well within our reach. There are several ways of doing this, based on the committed giving of individual or family units. For example:

*17 units at \$5.00 a week equals \$85 or \$4,420 a year *8 units at \$10.00 a week equals \$80 or \$4,160 a year *20 units at \$4.00 a week equals \$80 or \$4,160 a year *7 units at \$50 a month equals \$350 a month or \$4,200 a year.


A variety of combinations can be suggested, all adding up to the fact that we need dedicated commitment. Not all individuals or families have the same financial circumstances or have the same ability to make a commitment. But we do hope that everyone will make some kind of basic commitment or pledge. No group, including ours, can function or exist by occasional or sporadic giving. To want the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship to be here 52 weeks a year means there must be 52-weeka-year financial commitments.





Re: A Religious Education Program at the Upper Delaware UN Fellowship

Dear Friends:

At a recent meeting, the members of the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship decided on a major commitment to develop a program of religious education for children and young people. As you probably know, the Upper Delaware Fellowship meets every Sunday at 11:00 A. M. at Innisfree in Milanville. It is our intention to have the Religious Education Program held during this same hour, using the facilities of the Recreation Hall as well as some space in the River School.

We believe there is a definite desire and need for such a program of liberal and nondogmatic religious education. But before we make plans, it is essential that we have , indications of interest from parents. You can help by taking a few minutes to fill out and return the enclosed card. Please return the card even if you are not interested. What we need is a sense of the potential number of children who might attend.

Unitarian Universalism is quite unique in the spectrum of religious groups, for it has no binding creeds or dogmas. We believe that the ethical insights of religion are more important than abstract doctrines, and that the use of reason takes precedence over special revelations. Our first concern is the development of the child as a confident and creative individual, with a sense of her/his worth and dignity. In view of this, Unitarian Universalist curriculum material includes the following premises:

**Assumes that life is good and is worth living, and that people are basically good

**Does not deal with the supernatural, but regards religion as part of the natural world.

""Is based on current insights into child development and child psychology.

"*Recognizes the age and ability of each individual child.

suBeals with the child's world, with religion at his/her own level.

**Teaches the Bible only when the child is old enough to understand it, and then from the viewpoint of modern scholarship.





THE SUNDAYS IN MAY

We defend no sacred cows, we have no forbidden questions. The right of individual conscience, the use of reason and intelligence, and diversity of thought are all

central to our movement.

So come to church with us on Sunday at 11:00 A. M. at Innisfree in Milanville. Listed belows are our programs for the month of May.

<u>May 3</u> - "Some Pro's and Con's of Capital Punishment." The number of people in prison is on the rise, the number of executions is on the rise, and the amount of crime everywhere is on the rise. So are there any answers? More prisons, more arrests, more people executued in electric chairs and gas chambers? The program will consist of a brief presentation by Ray Pontier and followed by a discussion and sharing of opinions by those attending.

<u>May 10</u> - Someone from Planned Parenthood will speak about this very fine organization that has worked so hard for the needs of women. Planned Parenthood is about much more than abortion, but is concerned with a broad range of the needs of women in our society. This is a meaningful program for this Mothers Day Sunday.

<u>May 17</u> - Shannon Robbins will deliver remarks entitled "Witchcraft in Daily Life." A resident of Monticello, Shannon is an ordained minister of the National Alliance of Pantheists, a religious group based near Boston. Some may remember Shannon, her husband Carl, and their family when they attended our annual Thanksgiving meal in November.

<u>May 24</u> - "An Introduction to Ralph Waldo Emerson" will be the program led by the Rev. Raymond J. Pontier. We will have some background on the life of this famous Unitarian and also listen to one of his essays.

<u>May 31</u> - The ever-popular program of "Shared Readings" will be featured this Sunday. Suggestion: bring a reading dealing with women's rights. Or, of course, read whatever appeals to you for that date!

UNITARIANS SEEK RELIGIOUS TEACHER

MILANVILLE — The Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship is now accepting teacher applications for a youth religious education (RE) program slated to begin June 7.

In addition to preparing and teaching the 1½ hour Sunday curriculum, the position involves obtaining materials, coordinating volunteers, working in cooperation with the religious education committee, and handling finances. The ideal applicant would have a teaching background as well as some familiarity with Unitarian Universalism, although this is not required. Cultural, philosophical and doctrinal tolerance, and an ability to communicate these and other ethical values to children, are essential requirements.

The deadline for applications is April 26, when interviews will be conducted by the RE committee. The 11-month position will be salaried at \$1200 per year.

The fellowship meets at Innisfree in Milanville.



Here kindred spirits work at trusting Life's goodness and beauty to overcome our fear of its pain and heartache. Here we help transform the world.

Trust and transformation.

exhaustive) distinguish the liberal religious adventure. For me, they are absolutely essential for my life.


Out of them arise courage, hope and vision, and I share with you again words of my colleague, Greta Crosby:







RIVER SCHOOL TO GET GRANT FROM UUA

The Unitarian Universalist Grants Panel recently voted to support The River School with a grant of \$4,500. The River School is a UU-sponsoted parent-administered Montessori elementary school located at Innisfree. The school educates the children of the community in accordance with the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship's Statement of Purpose. The grant was given to assist in renovation of the school building.

According to a letter to our Fellowship president, Tom Rue, from UU Funding Program grants administrator Katherine Kelly The River School's proposal was one of 31 received. Over \$368,000 in funding was requested. All told, the panel made grants to 15 projects for a total of \$104,550.

The only "string" attached to the grant was that ". . . all communications, publicity and publications connected with [The River School] include the following or equivalent acknowledgement: "This project is funded in part by the Fund for Unitarian Universalism." This is in addition to the statement which the school has already agreed to make in its promotional material affirming sponsorship by the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship.

Ms Kelly stated a check should arrive from the UUA around the middle of December. After that, and after the terms of the Articles of Agreement between the Fellowship and the school have been signed and finalized, Fellowship treasurer Carmen Rue will turn the amount over to River School treasurer in a public ceremony.

Many thanks to the Unitarian Universalist Association -- and congratulations to The River School! UUA ANNUAL

PROGRAM FUND At the Annual Meeting of our Fellowship it was voted to pay our Fair Share Contribution to the Annual Program Fund of the

UU Association. Money from the Annual Fund goes to support and advance the work and outreach of the UUA in the United States and Canada. It includes, incidently, as subscription to the UU World for each member or family of a UU church or fellowship -- and in a larger way it assures that cause of liberal religion is kept alive and well.

The Fair Share for this year is \$26.00 a member -- and based on twenty members, our total will come to \$520 for the year.

Nothing is really free in this life or world -- including religion. If we want a vital Fellowship and believe our Unitarian Universalist heritage is worth keeping and spreading, then we need to support it. The Fair Share, of course, comes to only 50 cents a week per member, but support for our local Fellowship is considerably more. Realistic commitment means more than an occasional dollar or so in the tambourine but provides resources for the long haul.

<u>IN</u> Gil Mende is off and flying for his <u>BRIEF</u> trip around the world. We wish him well! ***Barbara and Ray Pontier will be heading for Florida after Christmas -- for all of January and perhaps beyond. ***Thanks to all who participated in the Thadsgiving Day Dinner. Sometimes bad things happen and yet sc ning good comes from the bad. We don't have enough perspective on life in any given instant to be able to say with certainty whether, over time, a particular event will be beneficial or harmful in our lives. I am reminded of an old Chinese story of wisdom that a friend once told me, so I will relate a short variation of the wise tale.

A farmer awoke one morning to find a wild horse had wandered onto his farm looking for food. He put the horse in with his horses and his neighbors exclaimed how lucky it was that such a fine horse had come to him. He replied, "Maybe it is, maybe it isn't." The next evening the horse broke the fence and all his horses ran away. Was this bad? "Maybe it is, maybe it isn't." Then the government came through to tax all the property and the domestic animals, but his tax was low because of the lack of horses. Later his horses came back, including the wild one - was this good? "Maybe..." except that his son was then motivated to tame the wild borse, so it wouldn't run away again -- and in the process was thrown and broke his arm and was laid up in bed and couldn't farm. Was it bad? "Maybe ... " But then the army came through and conscripted all able young men in the village, but left the son laid up in bed. Was this good or bad? "Maybe ... " and the story continues.

Some people say there is a silver lining in every cloud; others are afraid that good will only bring disaster. There is also the idea that the Universe is oblivious to good and bad -- that these are just our own perceptions. Perhaps the wisdom of the story is that we take what comes, and recognize that our opinion of "good" or "bad" may change as time unfolds.

ON BEING PART OF A LIBERAL RELIGIOUS COMMUNITY

The following guest column is by the Rev. Bruce Southworth, minister of the Community UU Church in New York City. We share some of his thoughts about our liberal religious tradition as Unitarian Universalists.

What does it mean to be part of a religious community-a liberal religious community? Answers are as varied as each member, but themes emerge.

We seek wholeness (traditionally called salvation.) Freedom to be who we are, to discover our best selves, to grow our souls, to think for ourselves about religious living—such freedom encourages us in the search for wholeness. Celebration of Life arises.

We seek principles to guide our living Religious traditions from around the world inform our lives, and we weave them with the lessons of history, science, art, literature-all realms of human endeavor. The searching - critical, appreciative mind leads to self-understanding and leads us to those principles of caring, compassion and action that contribute to spiritual health and wholeness.

We seek companionship and community. Interdependence is the reality of all life, and the spark of the divine within each of us responds to the spark within one another. We need not be all alone if we learn to risk vulnerability, dare to be open, and welcome the new. It becomes safe to be different and to become who we can be in our fullness and vibrancy. We know we can transcend the moments of brokenness and reclaim the health within us.

Here kindred spirits work at trusting Life's goodness and beauty to overcome our fear of its pain and heartache. Here we help transform the world.

Wholeness and celebration

Freedom and liberation. Principles to live by.

The searching, critical, appreciative

mind.

Companionship and community Interdependence and individuality. Trust and transformation.

For me these elements of religious community (which are by no means exhaustive) distinguish the liberal religious adventure. For me, they are absolutely essential for my life.

Out of them arise courage, hope and vision, and I share with you again words of my colleague, Greta Crosby:

Ultimately our trust is in the spirit that will not be quelled forever, that rises up in people from some mysterious source, energy that comes again to affirm that people matter, their needs and aspirations matter, and that the conditions of people's flourishing is the cultivation of truth and love.

The cultivation of truth and love-there is no better place than here to plant and tend the seeds of truth and love, and thus with joy to grow our souls.

We detend no sacred cows, we have no forbidden questions. The right of individual conscience, the use of reason and intelligence, and diversity of thought are all

central to our movement.

So come to church with us on Sunday at 11:00 A. M. at Innisfree in Milanville. Listed belows are our programs for the month of May.

<u>May 3</u> - "Some Pro's and Con's of Capital Punishment." The number of people in prison is on the rise, the number of executions is on the rise, and the amount of crime everywhere is on the rise. So are there any answers? More prisons, more arrests, more people executued in electric chairs and gas chambers? The program will consist of a brief presentation by Ray Pontier and followed by a discussion and sharing of opinions by those attending.

<u>May 10</u> - Someone from Planned Parenthood will speak about this very fine organization that has worked so hard for the needs of women. Planned Parenthood is about much more than abortion, but is concerned with a broad range of the needs of women in our society. This is a meaningful program for this Mothers Day Sunday.

<u>May 17</u> - Shannon Robbins will deliver remarks entitled "Witchcraft in Daily Life." A resident of Monticello, Shannon is an ordained minister of the National Alliance of Pantheists, a religious group based near Boston. Some may remember Shannon, her husband Carl, and their family when they attended our annual Thanksgiving meal in November.

<u>May 24</u> - "An Introduction to Ralph Waldo Emerson" will be the program led by the Rev. Raymond J. Pontier. We will have some background on the life of this famous Unitarian and also listen to one of his essays.

<u>May 31</u> - The ever-popular program of "Shared Readings" will be featured this Sunday. Suggestion: bring a reading dealing with women's rights. Or, of course, read whatever appeals to you for that date!

UNITARIANS SEEK RELIGIOUS TEACHER

MILANVILLE — The Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship is now accepting teacher applications for a youth religious education (RE) program slated to begin June 7.

In addition to preparing and teaching the 1½ hour Sunday curriculum, the position involves obtaining materials, coordinating volunteers, working in cooperation with the religious education committee, and handling finances. Re: A Religious Education Program at the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship

Dear Friends:

At a recent meeting, the members of the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship decided on a major commitment to develop a program of religious education for children and young people. As you probably know, the Upper Delaware Fellowship meets every Sunday at 11:00 A. M. at Innisfree in Milanville. It is our intention to have the Religious Education Program held during this same hour, using the facilities of the Recreation Hall as well as some space in the River School.

We believe there is a definite desire and need for such a program of liberal and nondogmatic religious education. But before we make plans, it is essential that we have indications of interest from parents. You can help by taking a few minutes to fill out and return the enclosed card. Please return the card even if you are not interested. What we need is a sense of the potential number of children who might attend.

Unitarian Universalism is quite unique in the spectrum of religious groups, for it has no binding creeds or dogmas. We believe that the ethical insights of religion are more important than abstract doctrines, and that the use of reason takes precedence over special revelations. Our first concern is the development of the child as a confident and creative individual, with a sense of her/his worth and dignity. In view of this, Unitarian Universalist curriculum material includes the following premises:

**Assumes that life is good and is worth living, and that people are basically good

**Does not deal with the supernatural, but regards religion as part of the natural world.

**Is based on current insights into child development and child psychology.

**Recognizes the age and ability of each individual child.

**Deals with the child's world, with religion at his/her own level.

- **Teaches the Bible only when the child is old enough to understand it, and then from the viewpoint of modern scholarship.
- **Asks questions more than it tries to answer them. Aims at helping children learn to answer the questions for themselves.

**Helps ideas to grow and develop; encourages independent thinking.

**Recognizes that there is truth in most churches, most religions, and helps the child look for this truth.

In order to provide more information, we invite you to attend a special program regarding a religious education program to be held Sunday, March 8th at 11:00 A. M. to be held at Innisfree in Milanville. If you see the need for such a program and identify with our goals and objectives, we do hope you will join with us. Come with your questions and suggestions. And please, return the enclosed card!

RIVER SCHOOL TO GET GRANT _ M UUA

The Unitarian Universalist Grants Panel recently voted to support The River School with a grant of \$4,500. The River School is a UU-sponsored parent-administered Montessori elementary school located at Innisfree. The school educates the children of the community in accordance with the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship's Statement of Purpose. The grant was given to assist in renovation of the school building.

According to a letter to our Fellowship president, Tom Rue, from UU Funding Program grants administrator Katherine Kelly The River School's proposal was one of 31 received. Over \$368,000 in funding was requested. All told, the panel made grants to 15 projects for a total of \$104,550.

The only "string" attached to the grant was that ". . . all communications, publicity and publications connected with [The River School] include the following or equivalent acknowledgement: "This project is funded in part by the Fund for Unitarian Universalism." This is in addition to the statement which the school has already agreed to make in its promotional material affirming sponsorship by the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship.

Ms Kelly stated a check should arrive from the UUA around the middle of December. After that, and after the terms of the Articles of Agreement between the Fellowship and the school have been signed and finalized, Fellowship treasurer Carmen Rue will turn the amount over to River School treasurer in a public ceremony.

Many thanks to the Unitarian Universalist Association -- and congratulations to The River School! UUA ANNUAL

PROGRAM FUND Fellowship it was voted to pay our Fair Share Contribution to the Annual Program Fund of the

UU Association. Money from the Annual Fund goes to support and advance the work and outreach of the UUA in the United States and Canada. It includes, incidently, as subscription to the UU World for each member or family of a UU church or fellowship -- and in a larger way it assures that cause of liberal religion is kept alive and well.

The Fair Share for this year is \$26.00 a member -- and based on twenty members, our total will come to \$520 for the year.

Nothing is really free in this life or world -- including religion. If we want a vital Fellowship and believe our Unitarian Universalist heritage is worth keeping and spreading, then we need to support it. The Fair Share, of course, comes to only 50 cents a week per member, but support for our local Fellowship is considerably more. Realistic commitment means more than an occasional dollar or so in the tambourine but provides resources for the long haul.

- 3. We believe in the authority of reason and conscience. The ultimate arbiter in religion is not a church, or a document, or an official, but the personal choice and decision of the individual.
- 4. We believe in the never-ending search for Truth. If the mind & heart are truly free and open, the revelations which appear to the human spirit are infinitely numerous, eternally. fruitful, & wonderously exciting.
- 5. We believe in the unity of experience. There is no fundamental conflict between faith and knowledge, religion and the world, the sacred and secular, since they all have their source in the same reality.
- 6. We believe in the worth and dignity of each human being. All people on earth have equal claim to life, liberty, and justice -- and no idea, ideal, or philosophy is superior to a single human life.
- 7. We believe in the ethical application of religion. Good works are the natural product of good faith, the evidence of an inner grace that finds completion in social and community involvement.
- 8. We believe in the motive power of love. The governing principle in human relationships is the principle of love, which always seeks the welfare of others and never seeks to hurt or destroy.
- 9. We believe in the necessity of the democratic process. Records are open to scrutiny, elections are open to members, and ideas are open to criticism -- so that people might govern themselves.
- 10. We believe in the importance of religious community. The validation of experience requires the confirmation of peers, who provide a critical platform along with a network of mutual support,

NOTICE TO MEMBERS OF THE FELLOWSHIP REGARDING SPONSORSHIP OF THE RIVER SCHOOL

As reported in the current Newsletter, a parent-run Montessori school known as The River School, which we voted to sponsor at our August annual meeting, opened its doors right on schedule at the beginning of September. Stop by and take a look at the beautiful construction job which school parents have done, on the main level of Innisfree's former dormitory building in Milanville. Classes for children aged six to nine, and nine to twelve, are in operation. About seventeen children are presently enrolled. Contributions to the school, made through the Fellowship, are tax-deductible. They have a "wish list" available.

Articles of Agreement between Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship and The River School have been substantially worked out by representative groups from both bodies, but not yet signed. The two-page draft document includes the following outlined points:

- 1. School will abide by relevant portions of UDUUF Statement of Purpose;
- 2. Fellowship will be represented on school board and membership [present UU designees include: Carmen Rue as board member; Bud and Tom Rue as membersat-large of The River School Association];
- 3. School will provide regular financial reports and minutes;
- 4. School will name Fellowship as a co-insured on liability insurance;
- 5. School is parent-run and will protect Fellowship board and members from liability, providing specific insurance if necessary;
- 6. School publicity material will affirm it "is sponsored by the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship;"
- 7. Fellowship requests use of school space for weekly religious education;
- 8. Renewal of sponsorship will be considered annually;
- 9. Fellowship will be held harmless for any act or omission by the school;
- 10. Articles of Agreement will be signed by representatives of both groups, and may be amended by mutual consent.



GETTING SERIOUS ABOUT

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Ever since our beginnings as a Fellowship, we have been working, even struggling, to become a viable religious community. Over the past four years we have come a considerable way -- including our acceptance as a member congregation of the Unitarian Universalist Association. We have also learned a thing or two.

One of the things we have learned is the very great need for a religious education program for children. Without such a dynamic program, it is doubtful that we will attract and maintain families with younger children. There are, we know, many parents who want their youngsters to have a positive exposure to relious/moral/spiritual concepts in a liberal and non-dogmatic atmosphere. As Unitarian Universalists, we are uniquely qualified to provide such a program.

To do so, however, means getting serious about the idea. An initial requirement, as I see it, is the need to offer someone a reasonable and decent compensation to serve as a Director of Religious Education for our Fellowship, and also to spend money on adequate Beacon Press R. E. materials. In my mind, this is a fundamental first step as we enter this fifth year of our Fellowship.

As a beginning, let us talk about it. How much money are we talking about? What sort of person are we looking for as a Director? How much will we offer as compensation? How much will members and friends give to make it happen!

A program-planning meeting is scheduled for Sunday September 8th. Let's talk it over then! Just how serious are we?

Dear Members and Friends,

Enclosed are fellowship secretary Gil Mende's minutes of the recent fifth annual meeting of members of the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. Also enclosed (see reverse of this letter) is a proposed budget for the coming year, put together by treasurer Carmen Rue as a result of discussion and resolutions at the annual meeting; as well as a Statement of Income Received and Expenses Paid for the year ended June 30, 1991. Please review these documents in relation to the amount you and your family regularly contribute to the fellowship. Continued financial support is vital to our functioning. If it is within your means, each family unit participating in the fellowship (voting member or not) is asked to contribute a minimum of \$150.00 per year, in order for the fellowship to meet its goal of making annual "fair share" assessments to the U.U.A. Annual Program Fund. Those who have not yet signed the Membership Book are so invited.

An item discussed during the pot-luck luncheon, after the meeting, concerned format of the "dialogue" portions of our Sunday services. It was agreed that in the future, at the end of speaker programs, the service leader will announce that after a 10 or 15 minute break (noon to about 12:15 p.m.), anyone interested in continuing on the topic at hand may resume discussion. Of course, anyone wishing to leave will be free to do so. But it is hoped that facilitating more dialogue and exchange of ideas will enhance the experience for those who share special interests. There have also been comments to the effect that some of us feel a need to make our programs a bit more epiritual and perhaps a bit less intellectual. This needs to be pursued too, with input from all quarters.

The most significant action taken during meeting, aside from election of the slate of officers as proposed at the bottom of the enclosed Order of Survice, was approval of a proposal to sponsor a Montessori school in the Innisfree dormitory building, called The River School. Fellowship/school affiliation will be reviewed by both groups at the end of one year. The new program will serve 6 to 9 year-olds and 9 to 12 year-olds, starting this September. Next year, parents hope to add a 3 to 6 year-old component to the program. Curricula and day-to-day operations will remain in the hands of a parent/teacher association, while corporate responsibility will be maintained by the fellowship executive committee. Financial records for The River School will be kept separately from those of the fellowship, with regular statements provided. Followship members are free to earmark tax-deductible donations to the fellowship to benefit The River School. It is hoped that the fellowship and the school will reflect positively on each other, and each will benefit as the two groups grow together. The values of those people involved with the school coincide closely with those held by many of us in the fellowship. In the near future, the school group will consider accepting the Upper Delaware fellowship's statement of purpose as fundamental to their own. Such an affirmation of mutual aims will solidify our connections and agreement to work together. A copy of a written proposal for the The River School may be obtained by contacting the fellowship's newest board member, Jesse Ballew at (717) 224-6387, who with his wife Collette Cohen Ballew have been active in the formation of the school. We wish children, parents and staff of the new school every success as they embark on this endeavor.

Reverend Ray Pontier will continue monthly publication of fellowship newsletters, announcing upcoming programs. We look forward to seeing you soon, with hopes for growth and prosperity.

The River School

MILANVILLE — A new parent-run school will open its doors in Milanville this coming September. The River School will offer a Montessori based program for 6 to 12 year olds in 1991-92. The following year a 3 to 6 year old program will be added as well.

The school is located in a converted dormitory building at the Innisfree Youth Hostel on a 13 acre compound overlooking the Delaware River. It will be directed and administered by a board of parents, with a staff of teachers and aides trained in the Montessori method. Maria Montessori, the first female physician in Italy, pioneered this child-centered method of education used throughout the world today.

This educational system uses observation of a child's development to offer curriculum appropriate to that child at that stage. Learning is accomplished through a child-centered prepared environment; respect for the child's body, mind, emotions and 'spirit; use of observation techniques; faith in human development; freedom of choice; and through offering concrete experiences before abstract experiences.

The elementary curriculum attempts to link the child to the world and to help the child become aware of the interdependency of all things and the fundamental needs shared by all humans. The study of language, geography, history, geology, botany, mathematics and geometry are the tools used to accomplish this. The developmental goals include independence, order, concentration and coordination.

Presently parents and volunteers are involved in materials and curriculum preparation, building renovation, fundraising and enrollment.




Morning has broken...

DESCENDING THE RIVER DELAWARE

"... In my Youth, I was Passenger in a little Sloop descending the River Delaware. There being no Wind, we were obliged, when the Ebb was spent, to cast anchor, and wait for the next. The Heat of the Sun on the Vessel was excessive, the Company Strangers to me, and not very agreable. Near the river Side I saw what I took to be a pleasant green Meadow, in the middle of which was a large shady Tree, where it struck my Fancy I could sit and read, (having a Book in my Pocket,) and pass the time agreably till the tide turned. I therefore prevail'd with the Captain to put me ashore. Being landed, I found the greatest part of my Meadow was really a Marsh, in crossing which, to come at my Tree, I was up to my Knees in Mire; and I had not placed myself under its Shade five Minutes, before the Muskitoes in Swarms found me out, attack'd my Legs, Hands, and Face, and made my Reading and my Rest impossible; so that I return'd to the Beach, and call'd for the Boat to come and take me aboard again, where I was oblig'd to bear the Heat I had strove to quit, and also the Laugh of the Company. Similar Cases in the Affairs of Life have since frequently fallen under my observation..."

The motion was made by Ray Pontier, seconded by Ann Rue, to accept the nominations and elect the entire slate as presented. The motion was passed unanimously.

Carmen Rue, treasurer, circulated copies of the treasurer's report for the past year.

On a motion by Bud Rue, it was unanimously voted to authorize payment of the \$284 balance of the annual dues to the Unitarian Universalist Association.

A motion by Ray Pontier to budget \$50 for UU literature was also passed; he will select and order the literature.

The president requested the secretary write a letter to Unlimited News of Monticello stating that the \$36 invoice the fellowship received dated Jan. 22, 1991, for a "directory of churches advertisement" will not be paid due to the fact that the corporation did not authorize an "advertisement."

A discussion ensued regarding the redesigning of the fellowship's stationery.

That led to the subject of the fellowship's brochure, which until this time has been photostated. Tom Rue asked for a motion to update the brochurd and have it professionally typeset. It was so moved by Gil Mende with the proviso that a \$200 cap be placed on the project, seconded by Bud Rue and passed. Tom Rue offered to work up a draft copy and submit it for approval at a regular Sunday meeting of the fellowship.

Tom and Carmen Rue will also work up a projected budget for the coming year, which will be submitted for approval.

Eve Murphy made the motion, seconded by Ray Pontier, to accept the treasurer's report as presented; the motion passed.


Bill Klaber was introduced and presented the concept of the fellowship's sponsoring the River School. Tom Rue read a list of his own ideas, concerns and expectations regarding the association of the fellowship and the school, emphasizing the mutuality of effort and responsibility that should be required of both parties. A long discussion ensued regarding the legal status of the fellowship in such an undertaking and the liability of the fellowship and its executive committee.

John Rue, having expressed strong reservations about both the philosophical linkage of the two groups and the lack of specific information on the liability question, moved to table a vote on the affiliation for two weeks and to establish a committee to study the two questions more thoroughly. The motion was seconded by Gil Mende and defeated by the vote of the remaining members present.

It was then moved by Bud Rue that the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship sponsor the River School for a period of one year, after which that sponsorship is to be reappraised. As amended by Ray Pontier that such sponsorship be contingent upon satisfactory liability protection being established, the motion was passed by the members present.

Ray Pontier then made the motion to adjourn.



ared acts of kindness." (Wordsworth ---)

The Unitarian Universalist approach to religion has a fundamental difference from that of more orthodox churches. Instead of asserting that the ultimate truth about the nature of life has been revealed to us, we assume that, together, we must engage in a search for those things which can give meaning and importance in our lives. Ours is a vital religion; one of inquiry and growth, rather than one of preconceived answers.

Our search is not blind. It is informed by the great religious traditions, including our own Judeo-Christian heritage and liberal religious roots. It is also informed by other insights of both past and present-the richness of the arts, the knowledge of the sciences, the wisdom of experience.

I know of no other religious institution taking such an approach. Here is both a respect for the past and an openness to the future ... a sharing of adults and children in a serious, yet joyous search.

that much. BUt we don't ignore or minimize it either. So th is the Newsletter to get it off our chests.

The fact is, the Upper Delaware UU Fellowship is no different from any other group in needing money in order to function. The monthly Newsletter is one item; the cost of paying heat and light at Innisfree is another. (And we get one hell of a bargain there!) We should be paying our speakers at least travel costs, as well as a modest honorarium. So far we've been pretty cheap in this area. There should be money for go (II) literature to inform newcomers -- and ourselves. And as w try to develop a religious education program, there is need to purchase adequate materials. Add to this the obligation we have to the annual program fund of the Unitarian Universalist Association -- with a fair share for each member of at least \$25 a year. Plus an annual contribution to the Joseph Priest Ley District.

The above are minimal. More can/should be added. But to func ion at around a poverty level we need the financial support of each member and/or family. The Problem of Excessive Packaging: As we are becoming more aware, a significant part of what we produce becomes waste. Much of this waste has a short life, serving no other purpose than product packaging.

The disposal of waste is a major national problem. Landfill sites are filling up years before their time, and the buried waste itself is becoming a significant source of ground water contamination.

While the development of recycling holds much promise, recycling is only a part of the solution. Take one minute, today or tomorrow, call and ask Procter and Gamble to offer its liquid products in the type of efficient, flexible, refill pouches that are available in supermarkets in southerm Ontario. Tell them that you are very concerned about the issue of excess product packaging and the impact that it is having in your local area. Tell them that as a good corporate citizen they have the responsibility of selling their products in the most efficient form of packaging possible.

If we all take the responsibility of doing this, and we circulate this pamphlet all over the country, Procter and Gamble will make these changes tomorrow. When Procter and Gamble changes so will Lever Brothers, Arm and Hammer, and Colgate Palmolive. When it becomes established that the issue of excessive packaging is important to the American consumer, corporations will compete with each other to find more efficient forms of packaging, and we will have realized that *this type of individual action is important, and can make a difference*.

THE MOST VIOLENT NATION

That's what the Senate Judiciary Committee said in a report recently released. The United States is "the most violent and destructive nation on Earth." Violence in this country has no equal among the world's developed countries. More than 1.8 million Americans were murdered, raped, robbed, or assaulted in 1990. Since 1960 the population of the United States has grown 41 percent, while violent crimes have increased 516 percent! Our murder rate is nine times higher than England,s and 11 times Japan's. Rape here is 23 times higher than Italy and 26 times higher than in Japan. So it goes in every catagory of violence and crime.

Violence is everywhere. Television and movies capitalize on it. Our recent "glorious" victory in the war against Iraq, at the cost of untold billions of dollars, killed an estimated 80 to 100,000 Iraqis, laid waste cities, and spread disease and suffering. In the meantime, <u>human</u> needs (housing, education, etc.) remain unmet. We may have a poor trade balance, but we know how to export violence!

Domestic Violence remains pervasive. At the St. Patrick's Day Parade this year, Mayor Dinkens and the Gay contingent with whom he marched suffered the wrath of the Gay-bashers who shouted epithets and threw beer cans. Violence is everywhere -- but the poor, women, Gays, and Blacks are prime targets. Especially Blacks! The recent brutal beating of a black man by Los Angeles police is endemic -- recorded on home video and shown so all the world could watch. Black ople have known violence, police and other, for a long time. So Langston Hughes wrote years ago:

> I looked and I saw That man they called the law. He was coming Down the street at me! I had visions in my head of being laid out cold amd dead, Or else murdered By the third degree.

I said, O Lord if you can Save me from that man! Don't let him make a pulp out of me! But the Lord he was not quick. The Law raised up his stick And beat the living hell Out of me!

Now I do not understand Why God don't protect a man From police brutality. Being poor and black, I've no weapon to strike back So who but the Lord Can protect me?

We'll see.

With the disclosure of the alarming rise in child abuse, this is an important subject for everyone '-- parents, grandparents, relatives, and concerned people everywhere.

<u>March 10</u> - Because of a cancellation, this date is temporarily open. But there will be a program which will be announced at the Fellowship and in the news media.

<u>March 17</u> - Kristen Ammerman-Scofield of Honesdale, a member of the selection committee of Wayne County Habitat for Humanity, will speak about the family selection process, as well as the progress of the group in building a home for a local family. This is a program of particular interest to our Fellowship because of our initial impetus to Habitat, but especially because of the tireless efforts of Bud Rue.

<u>March 24</u> - The Rev. Raymond J. Pontier, Consulting minister of the Fellowship, will speak on the subject: "Enduring Values in Ancient Christian Myths." Many people have an inability to think symbolically or mythologically. There are those who would accept myths literally on face value, and those who toss all of them out as nonsense. The talk will deal with some of the enduring values and meanings in Christian mythology and, at the start of Christian Holy Week, some of those associated with Good Friday and Easter.

<u>March 31</u> - On this last Sunday of the month we will have a program of "Shared Readings" -- maybe some shared wisdom. This happens to be Easter Sunday, so some may wish to talk about any personal meanings this day may have -- or about Passover which starts March 29th. In any event, bring along some prose, a poem, or your own thoughts.

MARCH MADNESS

If March has a dubious reputation -- and it does -- it is not wholly without reason. There is a hint of madness in the mere mention of the March hare. Dark deeds are somehow inherent in the ides of March. There is March mud, there are March floods, and there is the lion-lamb tradition.

There is more to it than such items, however. The whole story of March includes the vernal equinox, daylight at least exceeding darkness. It includes red-winged blackbirds, back from the South, clamoring in the stream-side tree-tops. It includes pussy willows in fat, silvery catkin. Not today, not even a week from today, but one day before March ends in April.

And there will be those unpredictable days when the March air is warm, the March breeze is gentle, the March sun is friendly as late April. And somewhere March is boys playing marbles, girls playing jacks and hopscotch. Maybe we give March a dubious reputation because we are an impatient kind of animal.

We haven't learned yet that the trip often is more important than the destination. With February out of the way, we want May, or April at the very least; and the only way to April or May is through March. And March insists on being March, neither sinister nor mad, but a mixture of old endings and new beginnings.

Fellowship affiliates with U.U.A.

On October 26, 1990, the board of trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations in North America (U.U.A.) voted to admit to membership the Upper Delaware Unitarian Universalist Fellowship! This was terrific news for those of us who have waited over three years for that connection to occur.

A "formal token of [that] very special relationship", in the form of a certificate signed by U.U.A. president William B. Schultz and secretary Barry Johnson-Fay, now hangs framed in the fellowship's meeting hall at Innisfree.

"We are delighted that this step has been taken. It is my pleasure to welcome you as a member congregation of the Unitarian Universalist Association and to express the Board's hope that your society will grow and prosper," Johnson-Fay wrote.

Members of the Upper Delaware fellowship will soon begin receiving copies of <u>The World</u>, a slick denominational magazine of which samples have been available in the meeting room for some time.

When we adopted our fellowship by-laws, we expressed it as our intent to make an annual "fair share" contribution to U.U.A. This amount is set at \$22.00 per year for each fellowship member, in order to qualify for the status of "honor society". This remains our goal for each coming year.

Joseph Priestley District

When we were accepted into membership of U.U.A., it was • the recommendation of the Joseph Priestley District president Donald L. Stevenson, as well as Carl Haag, president of the Metropolitan New York District, that our group be assigned to J.P.D., as a result of our meeting place in Pennsylvania.

"We are both in agreement with the principle that district affiliation of a congregation be determined by its meeting place, and, therefore, I look forward to welcoming UDVUUF into the Joseph Priestley District. Carl and I also agreed that if, at some future time, UDVUUF moves) its meeting place to New York, then it would make sense for them to transfer their district affiliation to Metro New York," Stevenson wrote in a recommendation letter addressed to the extension department of U.U.A.

Since we intended to affiliate with the Metropolitan New York District, we must now consider whether to amend our fellowship by-laws to join with J.P.D. (see enclosed notice of special meeting of the membership).

J.P.D. is one of 23 Unitarian Universalist districts, serving 58 societies in central and eastern Pennsylvania, southern New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, northern Virginia, and the District of Columbia. It consists of 11,600 members in local societies, and is subdivided into four area



councils. Our fellowship lies within the Susquehanna Valley council.

The district is served professionally by Rev. Sidney Peterman, district consultant, and by Rev. Dorris Dow Alcott, consulting minister in religious education.

District program committees focus on: communications, denominational affairs, extension, financial record keeping (being developed), lesbian and gay concerns, women and religion, youth/adult, leadership development, and, Annual Program Fund.

J.P.D. district president Don Stevenson, of Wilmington, Delaware, will personally welcome us into U.U.A. and the district at the **NOVEMBER 18th** meeting. All members and friends are strongly urged to attend. Following a sermon by our own Rev. Ray Pontier about ethical decision making, Don will lead a fellowship discussion on the subject of growth. Bring a dish for a pot-luck luncheon to follow the service.

Contributions now tax-deductible

With membership in U.U.A., contributions to our local fellowship are now officially recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as "charitable contributions", deductible from the donor's federal income tax.

"Under the current Internal Revenue Code provisions and regulations issued thereunder, churches are automatically tax exempt, I.R.C. Sections 501(a), 501(c)(3) and Sections 508(c)(1)(A)," U.U.A. executive vice president Kathleen Montgomery wrote in a separate letter.

Copies of the I.R.S. letter of determination, as well as a brief letter certifying our fellowship to be "a member congregation in good standing" of U.U.A., are available from fellowship president Tom Rue.



REFLECTIONS ON PAST, PRESENT, FUTUK.

Now, as we continue in our fourth year since our organization, we are about to be received as a member congregation of the Unitarian Universalist Association. This is not official as yet, but it seems most likely in view of the positive recommendations on our behalf. We should receive definite word by the first of November.

When this happens, it should be cause for great rejoicing and celebration. As a liberal religious Fellowship we will be joining with over 150,000 other Unitarian Universalists in over 1,000 congregations across the country. As denominations go, we are not large. Indeed, measured by some, we are a small speck on the horizon. But over the long years of our history, dating back to before the American Revolution, we have been influential far beyond our numbers. It has been said that where Unitarian Universalists are today, Protestantism will be tomorrow. Maybe even Roman Catholicism. We have been avante garde on such things as women's rights, civil rights, pro-choice in abortion, Gay rights, as well as the peace movement. Orthodox religion may not have caught up to us theologically, but there is movement in our direction.

As a Fellowship we represent the only truly liberal religius community in a radius of over 50 miles. The Upper Delaware UU Fellowship is an important asset to this entire region. As a friend of mine once said about the previous UU Fellowship I served: "You are an oasis in a desert of conservativism." Indeed we are!

It is in the nature of a minor miracle that we have msde it this far -- thanks to the dedication and commitment of a core group of people. Whether we will make it into the future remains an open question. The need is here. That is obvious. But a bright future will depend on a number of factors. More people are needed who give priority to Sunday services. More people are needed who are committed to regular financial support. More people are needed who will help us grow by reaching out to others.

As a Fellowship we depend on regular, systematic giving if we are to be a functioning organization. So, please, get off a check today or make your contribution on Sunday. - The rights of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;




The living tradition we share draws from many sources:



GETTING TO KNOW THE UNI). .AN UNIVERSALISTS

The Unitarian Universalist Association is a religious organization that combines two traditions: the Universalists, who organized in 1793, and the Unitarians, who organized in 1825. They merged into the UUA in 1961. Both groups trace their roots in North America to the early Massachusetts settlers and to the founders of the Republic. Overseas their heritages reach back centuries to pioneers in England, Poland, and Transylvania.

There are more than a thousand congregations (Churches, Fellowships, Societies) in the United States, Canada, and overseas --all democratic in policy and operation and govern themselves. They unite, however, in the Unitarian Universalist Association to provide services and join in ventures they cannot do by themselves.

As a national body, the UUA is governed by a Board of Trustees who are elected by delegates (from each Church or Fellowship) to the General Assembly which meets annually in various areas of the continent. For operational purposes, the denomination is divided into 23 Districts. When we become fully affiliated we probably will belong to the Metropolitan New York District, or commonly called the Metro District.

Unitarian Universalism is a liberal religion with Jewish-Christian roots. It has no creed. If affirms the worth of human beings, advocates freedom of belief and the search for advancing truth, and tries to provide a warm, open, supportive community of people who believe that ethical living is the supreme witness of religion.

The above, somewhat edited, is taken from the Annual Directory of the UUA. It is hoped that we can soon be fully identified with this larger community of Unitarian Universalists!

After all, the sky was so big there would always be enough for everybody to eat. What did it matter if they broke off more than they actually wanted?

Maybe it didn't matter to them, but it mattered to the sky. In fact, it made the sky angry to see itself lying on the ground, half-eaten, like garbage. So one day the sky spoke out and said, "Now look-a-here! Cant have this! Uh-uh. Can't have you people just breaking off a piece of me every time your stomach grow1s and then taking a little bite and throwing the rest away. Now if y'all don't cut it out, I'm going to move so far away no one will ever touch me again. You understand?

Well, people got the message. In fact, they were pretty scared, and for a while they made sure that no one every broke off more of the sky than they could eat. But slowly they began to forget. One day, a man came by and broke off a chunk big enough to feed forty people for a month. He took a few little bites, licked

around the edges, threw the rest over his shoulder, and walked on down the road just as happy and dumb as anything you've ever seen. Well, the sky didn't say a word, but with a great roar, the sky lifted itself up as high as it could, and that was pretty high.

When the people realized what was happening, they began crying and pleading with the sky to come back. They promised that they would never do it again, but the sky acted like it didn't hear a word.

The next day, the people didn't have a thing to eat, and they had to go to work to feed themselves, and that's why folks are working to this very day.



Saying No to Columbus

At a recent conference in Mexico City spokespersons for the World Council of Indian Peoples (CMPI) condemned projected celebrations of America's "discovery" in 1492, estimating that more than 90 million Indians have been killed resisting conquest in the subsequent 500 years: "For Spain, the date symbolizes opening up a New World and offerings of bounteous riches. For the Indian people, however, [it is] as a date of mourning, as it brings memories of massacres, destruction and the loss of the best material and cultural values that were passed down to them by their ancestors." Jorge Valiente Quipildor, a Kolla from northern Argentina and vice-president of CMPI, added that 'no group of people wants to celebrate such widespread genocide."

On October 5 the Colorado Conference of Churches called upon congregations to participate in a "service of confession, repentance and reconciliation" in 1992 in recognition of the oppression Native Americans have suffered since Columbus's arrival.

Minutes of both meetings, as well as a copy of the By-Laws are filed in the Membership Book, in the meeting room.




THE SWASTIK

Before the Nazis corrupted its meaning, the swastika, or hooked cross, had other meanings.

According to Winston's Cumulative Encyclopedia (1915), it is a religious symbol used by early races from Scandinavia to Persia and India to represent the sun, associated with the worship of Apollo and Odin.

Similar devices occur in the monumental remains of the ancient Mexicans and Peruvians, and on objects

exhumed from prehistoric burial mounds in the United States.

Reportedly, the symbol (also called a gammadion) dates to the Bronze Age in Europe, and still exists is a religious symbol in India. Persia, China, Japan, and among North, Central, and South American Indians: believed to be a token of good luck or blessing (Funk & Wagnalls, 1970, with illustrations).


